ANGLICAN FUND FOR HEALING AND RECONCILIATION

The Healing Fund, established in 1991, offers financial support to community grassroots initiatives that focus on healing and reconciliation. The Healing Response Committee, with representatives from the Anglican Council of Indigenous People and the Council of General Synod represent the diversity of Indigenous communities across the country, determine the granting criteria, and review and decide on applications submitted to the Anglican Healing Fund.

The Healing Response Committee understands that the process of healing is unique to each individual, family and community. Therefore, it provides support to a wide range of community healing initiatives. Here are a few examples:

- Healing services provide direct healing services through either traditional or western methodologies; focused either on family, individual and community.
- Prevention and Awareness community activities aimed at raising awareness of the legacy of the Indian residential school, suicides, cycle of violence and abuse, and substance abuse.
 - Over the last couple of years, there has been an increase in suicide prevention/postvention community healing initiatives. These projects generally include education on grief processing and support for the people who have lost someone they care about deeply and are left grieving and struggling to understand.
- Education and Awareness activities aimed at raising awareness of the impacts of the residential school system, history of the residential schools, indigenous traditions and cultures
- Conferences/Gatherings/Reunions includes workshops, speakers, presenters, ceremonies
- Training enhancing community capacity and skills to address needs and issues
- Language translation, language programming, language revitalization and curriculum development.
 - Over the past few years, there has been a large increase in innovative language revitalization related initiatives across the country. These myriad language projects and programs represent restorative nation-building efforts by grassroots community-based Aboriginal people engaged in the work of self-determination and healing. The vision is to bring language fluency among language speakers and the younger generation, thereby, extending the lifetime of critically endangered languages spoken only by a few elders and community members.
- Resource Development community resources, documenting history, remembrance, curriculum development, etc.
- Relationship Building building relationships and /or partnerships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples. This includes the reconciliation

Priority is given to:

- 1. Projects that are committed to long-term community healing
- 2. Projects that relate to children, youth and Elders cultural learning activities
- 3. Projects that involve community healing
- Projects that encourage language and cultural restoration and/or maintenance.
- 5. Projects that create or promote local networks communities/groups working together.

- 6. Projects that feature building a right relationship or partnership between Indigenous people and non-aboriginal people
- 7. Projects that enable survivors/family to attend an event related to irs healing; such as, TRC, etc.

As of December 2015: the Healing Fund has funded 631 projects totaling \$7,046,703
